

School District of River Ridge Academic and Career Planning Policy



Chapter PI-26 is the legislation in the State of Wisconsin that requires every school district to provide academic & career planning services to pupils enrolled in grades 6 to 12 in the school district beginning in the 2017-18 school year.

Academic and Career Planning is:

- A dynamic process built on student visions & goals documenting student interests, abilities & values as they relate to career decision making.
- Provides students & parents with information needed to make **INFORMED CHOICES** for education, training and careers.
- Connects goals to college & career exploration & planning
- ACP honors **ALL** postsecondary routes

4 Stages to successful Academic & Career Planning (ACP)



Know – Who am I? Get to know your interests, skills & strengths

Explore – Where do I go? Explore career pathways & education opportunities

Plan – How do I get there? Set goals, choose courses, join clubs & activities, obtain financing, fill out applications, write resumes

Go! – Recalculate as needed

1. **Know** – The students will identify & explore personal strengths & needs related to academic & career goals.

- ***Self-Awareness***

- **Middle School Students**

- Interpret inventory results & can articulate their personal strengths, work values, learning styles & interests, then link them to potential careers.
- Set short and long term goals as they relate to their strengths.
- Revisit & revise personal, academic & career planning goals annually.

- **High School Students**

- Interpret & can articulate their personal strengths, work values, learning styles & interests then link them to a selection of careers.
- Apply their skills, interests, work values, extracurricular activities & life experiences to goal setting and creation of ACP.
- Explain how their goals fit with their personal skills & attributes, current activities and postsecondary plan.

- ***Financial Knowledge***

- **High School Students**

- Interpret knowledge of financial topics to compare personal finances, costs of postsecondary options & financial trends of different careers.

2. Explore – The students will identify, explore, and interpret different career pathways, labor markets, postsecondary options related to interests & strengths.

- ***Career Exploration***

- **Middle School Students**

- Identify 2-3 career clusters that are compatible with their interests & strengths as identified in assessments.
- Use inventory results to identify careers of interests.
- Engage in a variety of extracurricular activities.

- **High School Students**

- Take career inventories & assessments for career exploration & reflect on results.
- Use career pathway information that correlates to strengths & interests to identify careers of interests.
- Describe how careers of interest relate to their assessment information & interests & reflect on areas of growth.
- Make connections between skills acquired in & out of school & how they apply to careers of interest.
- Engage in job shadowing, school to work program, part-time work and other career exploration activities.

- ***World of Work & Labor Market***

- **High School Students**

- Learn which different “soft skills” are needed for different pathways.
- Use labor market information to understand how salary levels differ by level of education, job responsibilities and skills required.
- Identify the financial impact of specific careers.

- Compare postsecondary options based on programs of study & costs.
- Explore postsecondary opportunities for gaining technical skills such as apprenticeships, certifications & articulated courses.

3. Plan – Throughout their Middle School and High School experience, students will learn the process of creating and revising their ACP. They will implement their plan, and adjust periodically.

- ***Planning Skills***

- **Middle School Students**

- Create a personalized plan to transition to high school & postsecondary options
- Use plan as tool to consider choices, plan high school course selection & transition to high school
- Students, teachers, counselors & families have access to ACP information.

- **High School Students**

- Document courses taken, updated assessments, career & postsecondary research, personality type, work values, interest profiles as they relate to the selection of career & other postsecondary plans.
- Identify strategies for improving educational achievement as needed for postsecondary & career goals.
- Adjust their plans based educational achievement.
- Document information & experiences for each high school year that can be accessed for postsecondary applications & resumes.

- Complete the FAFSA know where to access other financial aid & scholarship information.
- Develop a financial plan to align with postsecondary education or training costs.
- Participate in work-based learning opportunities.
- Students, teachers, counselors & families have access to ACP information.
- Discuss plan for transition to postsecondary education including sequence of high school course, application requirements, timelines for applications financial aid submission & requirements for entrance into careers of interest.

4. Go – Students will review and update their ACP one to two times a year to progress toward their career goals.

- ***Execution of Plan***

- **Middle School Students**

- Continue to explore different career options.
- Participate in one or more ACP, career-related activities.
- Add information to plan as researched.
- Update plan each year.

- **High School Students**

- Review & revise ACP one to three times a year.
- Participate in multiple ACP, career-related activities.
- Present progress against previous goals & plans for next steps in an annual review.
- Increase review if needed as graduation nears.
- Continuously evaluate opportunities as they pertain to current goals for knowing, exploring & planning for post high school plans.
